We heard them on the roof a while back and assumed they were the squirrels we were so used to hearing through the years. Unfortunately, what we had heard was the sound of raccoons seeking shelter for their young in a crawl space just under our roof.

A professional "wildlife removal" company has been setting traps in cages and removing the animals, humanely relocating and releasing them in woods about 15 miles away. Once they are gone, the crew will clean and seal the invaded area so we can get on with our lives.

It was the Rolling Stones, as I recall, who once famously sang that "you can't always get what you want." That is surely true concerning the trapping of animals. In addition to the ones we have targeted, we have also had removed several opossum and (twice) a neighborhood cat of dubious intelligence.

I used to say that, should I be blessed to see God in the next life, my first question will be, "So why mosquitos?" Now I need to add raccoons to that list. Sometimes, God's marvelous creation can leave us humans mighty baffled.


