#### Serving At The Altar

Perhaps you have noticed in our bulletin where this parish is in need of altar servers. "In need of" puts it mildly. We currently have only a handful of persons filling that role.

It's interesting how reluctant many folks are to step forward to serve. This is certainly not a difficult role to learn. Many grade school servers begin in the fifth grade. The skills needed are important but basic. The real challenge in serving involves learning to do so with grace and reverence, so that while one is around the altar, one's presence is barely noticed because one is not doing anything to draw attention to oneself. The rudiments of serving are easy to learn; becoming a server whose presence reflects a sense of the holy takes time. In our parish, David McClain is the server who best exemplifies this combination of skills and reverence, as he has for a long time.

Serving at the altar is a special privilege. I was fortunate to start in fifth grade and served regularly through eighth grade in my parish, then more sporadically in high school but fairly often through the years in various dioceses at daily Mass. Years ago, there were always plenty of youngsters able to step in and serve on Sundays. Later, as parishes closed and too many parents stopped bringing their children to Mass regularly, the number of trained available servers dwindled dramatically.

For most of us who started serving in the early 1960s, it is fascinating to see how what is expected of servers now has changed. Back then, we wore black cassocks and white lace surplices; all of us wore highly polished black shoes. Tennis shoes? Unthinkable! You didn't wear them into such a holy site. You dressed as if you knew God was there.

Another major difference was that, in the 1960s, it took weeks of rigorous practices under the watchful eye of an Ursuline nun before any of us were deemed fit to serve even the simplest daily Mass. Such discipline was possible because there were so many boys waiting and eager to join the ranks of servers. It was seen as a real privilege to be chosen for that role. Today it would surprise me if many of today's more sophisticated youngsters would put up with such a training regimen. It would pull them away from hours at their various devices.

Here's the question: Who will step forward here to embrace this important ministry?

#### Faith Formation Series Highlights

Father John Jerek continued his Fall Faith Formation Series Oct. 16 with more insights into what the Catholic Church in America was like in its first centuries. Worth noting:

- In 1770, there were 50,000 Catholics in the 13 colonies served by 25 priests; today we are 25% of the nation's population
- Famous "Catholic Haters" included Cotton Mather, who established Harvard, and Samuel Adams, brewer
- John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and George Washington "were champions of religious freedom"..."we were not founded as a Christian nation"
- One Roman Catholic was a signer of the Declaration of Independence; also signed by 32 Anglicans, 13 Congregationalists, 12 Presbyterians, 2 Quakers, 2 Unitarians
- Despite bitter anti-Catholicism prevalent,
   Charles Carroll of Carrollton, a Catholic, was the nation's richest man in 1775, owning 100,000 acres
- The Puritans (United Church of Christ now, with Congregationalist roots) settled in New England and passed strict anti-Catholic laws. Ironically, this is the most Catholic area of the present USA
- The Calvinists, who were elitist and believed most people would be damned, believed in predestination of the Elect, "an exclusive club for the saved"; had an important influence on beliefs that shaped our national thinking
- John Locke, "the philosopher behind our Constitution," believed that rights were at the center of society and religious toleration was necessary, but there should be none for Catholics.


