No Ordinary Doorkeeper

When I heard recently that the eighth graders at St. Christine School were headed to Detroit for their graduation trip, there were two reasons that I was pleased.

The first was that I believe they truly deserved the trip and I was pleased that the parish and school made it possible. The second reason was more personal: They were going to visit the Solanus Casey Center, and Solanus, a Capuchin friar who died in 1957, is a personal faith hero of mine.

I love the story of Father Solanus' life because it is a story of how God sees gifts where others might see pure ordinariness or even abject failure. After struggling in the seminary, his own religious order designated him as a "simplex priest," meaning he could celebrate Mass but not preach or hear confessions.

While others might have felt slighted, Solanus accepted the role that his order assigned to him: Porter (doorkeeper) in their monasteries. He was to handle the humble task of welcoming visitors and listening to their requests for spiritual guidance and help.

Some doorkeeper! Soon it became clear that folks were coming hour after hour by the dozens to pray with this extraordinarily gifted man and share their spiritual struggles. Over the course of time he is said to have prayed with some 20,000 persons, becoming a beloved figure. Eccentric, too: At breakfast, he would famously pour orange juice, milk, and fruit into his cereal and consume them together.

Today, the Solanus Casey Center welcomes thousands of visitors each year. When we were there some years ago, the Center and its displays and contents were a revelation: All that spiritual beauty and sacredness, alongside Solanus' burial site, in the heart of a very rough area filled with burned out houses, cars up on cement blocks, and graffiti sprayed everywhere. But still the visitors come, seeking to pray where this gentle man lived out the humblest of occupations — and through a gift from God, saw deeply into their hearts and minds to give them the spiritual wisdom they sought.

Blessed Solanus, pray for us and for the St. Christine graduates, that they may grow ever closer to the Lord you served so well.




