Memories On A Calendar

It's interesting how a habit developed years ago can keep bringing to mind past slices of one's life.

I'm thinking of my annual practice of filling a datebook for the new year with the names and dates of death for those relatives who have gone to God. I include the birthdays of these loved ones as well, but it's the name, a cross, and the year of their passing that most forcefully brings them to mind.

It was such an encounter this week when I came across the name of Bob Mills, who died 20 years ago. He was born in Cleveland in 1911, but became something of a celebrity across the Southwest in the 1950s to 1990s as a ringmaster at horse shows. Bob was every inch the tall "Marlboro Man" in appearance, completely at ease on a horse, a gentle soul who lived to the age of 94. In between horse shows, he painted barns and houses in the fierce Arizona heat well into his eighties.

Bob was a relative by marriage. He was married to my cousin Jeannette, a feisty, well read, delightful old woman born in 1904, the only child of my grandmother's sister. Thinking of Bob and Jeannette reminded me that, in the early 1970s, I visited their home in Phoenix several times and enjoyed their boundless hospitality. Bob drove me around in the spectacular Arizona scenery, while Jeannette shared precious memories of my father, whom she had known as a child, teen, and in his 20s. For years I kept her warm, insightful letters, often sent in envelopes decorated with Bob's drawings of horses he had encountered.

Coming across their names again reminded me of how much I had yearned, in those college days, to move to Arizona and escape Ohio winters. But my folks were elderly, and for a variety of reasons I never took up an offer of a reporter's job there. At the time, Phoenix seemed like paradise, long before the traffic became unbearable and the area's problems insurmountable.

Remaining in the Midwest led my life in entirely different directions which proved, in God's wisdom, to be far better for me. But I'll always cherish those visits with Bob and Jeannette. May their good souls rest in the arms of God.

Sunday's Scriptures: Intimacy and Feasts

Today's readings are from Isaiah 62: 1-5; 1 Corinthians 12: 4-11; Gospel of John 2: 1-11.

Our readings today can lead us to meditate on two themes: feast and intimacy. Our God takes great delight in both.

"There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, they have no wine.'"

Jesus tells his mother that his hour has not yet come, and yet Mary is not rebuffed by this. She tells them, "do whatever He tells you." Mary is confident that Jesus, in his goodness, mercy, and love, will help this bride and groom in their need.

Jesus takes six strong water jars, each filled with 20 to 30 gallons of water, and transforms this water into fine wine. Jesus loves such feasts and signs of love and intimacy. He is extravagant in this miracle, making 120-180 gallons of wine. The wedding feast will be a joyous one.

Some three years later, He will gather with his disciples on the night before he dies. At this Passover feast he will perform a greater transformation when he turns bread into his very Body and wine into his Blood. At this feast the disciples will not eat fine bread and fine wine but Jesus himself. They feast on Jesus and he intimately becomes one with them.

We gather this Sunday and remember the wedding feast at Cana in our Gospel reading, and then come to the altar where we feast on Jesus in the Eucharist. We eat his Body given up for us, and his Blood poured out for us and the whole world. We eat and are filled with Our Lord Jesus Christ. He is as intimate with us as he was 2,000 years ago with his disciples. We become completely one with him.

Let us come often to become one with him, and when we die may we feast in the Everlasting Supper of the Lamb.




