#### Life Lessons From 'McGuffey'

One thing that is undeniably true is that, as we age, we realize we cannot keep everything we have accumulated over decades of living. That's a reality I keep coming up against as I sort through mementos from my folks, who have been gone 40 years and more now.

For decades I have kept a glass-door bookcase filled with some of the items my folks treasured, and others that merely remind me of this or that aspect about them. When I recently gave away some of the books that were among these family trinkets and treasures, I came across a little volume that held special interest.

It was a New McGuffey Fifth Reader from 1901, and my father had signed it "Ravenna Street, Hudson, Ohio." Since he was born in 1902, and lived in Hudson circa 1910-15, he must have been about eight to 13 when he had this book assigned in school. He was surely using it in grade school.

As I leafed through that 352-page little 5" x 7" reader, I was astounded at the depth of the material covered in those days compared to what today's youngsters are expected to read and know. Many of today's publishing houses are putting out cartoonish drivel and students are assigned to read it, unthinkable in 1910. Back in the early 1900s, it appears, even "junior high" students were being exposed to the likes of Henry David Thoreau, Louisa May Alcott, Shakespeare, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow and the delights of Washington's Irving's "Rip Van Winkle."

From even a cursory look through the table of contents, one sees that those who were learning to read from McGuffey in the early 1900s were being exposed to material many current graduates of Ivy League schools have no idea exists. We have so watered down what passes for learning these days, often dumping the great works from the past in favor of trendy authors of the day, that it is entirely possible to graduate with a degree from an "elite" university now without ever having been exposed to the greatest minds of the past.

It is of special interest that the editor of the 1901 McGuffey edition writes that he sought to include "lessons inculcating kindness, courage, obedience, industry, thrift, patriotism and other duties and obligations." All traits needed in 1901, no doubt. All so much more needed now in this era when our nation seems to be abandoning every value we once held dear.




