# The Shepherd of Hermas

I suppose by now it is no state secret that I am a very poor sleeper. Getting two or three hours in a row is about the norm, dating back to my years in journalism when I would often get an hour's worth of sleep on the night before deadline. Usually I fall asleep about 11 p.m., wake up near 2 a.m., and don't get back to sleep until it's almost time to get up.

I won't flatter myself that my sleep patterns are of much interest to the general public per se, but they may be of interest in this one regard: In the hours that I cannot sleep, I read, and most often I read about the Church Fathers in a four-volume set, edited by Johannes Quasten, entitled "Patrology" that my wife and I bought for each other years ago.

It is fascinating reading, and one of the more fascinating characters from those ancient days is Hermas, author of "The Shepherd of Hermas." It is particularly interesting reading because I have read it about 10 times and still never remember what I have read for more than a day or two. I have only read snippets of the larger work, but Hermas himself interests me. His work is a book of revelation that he was granted in Rome by an angel and a shepherd; it was written about 140-150 A.D.

The revelations themselves are pretty basic, covering such topics as sin, penance, the destiny of Christianity and various aspects of living the faith. The real fascination, as Quasten notes, is that "there is hardly a work of ancient Christian times in which the life of the community passes before us with such vividness as The Shepherd of Hermas." The work covers good and bad Christians in their triumphs, faults, and failings, including those who had denied the faith to escape Roman persecution. Above all, what surprised me was that for several centuries, some of the brightest minds in the Church held this work to be as important as the Sacred Scriptures themselves.

What also makes these pages so interesting, as Quasten explains so well, is that "with good natured sincerity, Hermas relates all manner of intimate matters concerning himself and his relatives." I laughed right out loud at 3 a.m when I read that "Hermas has nothing good to say of his wife, who talks too much and cannot bridle her tongue."

All in all, Hermas makes the ancient Christian communities come alive, a precious gift to us these many centuries later.

Just two weeks until our first Drive-Thru Fish Dinner of 2025 on Friday March 7. We always welcome new parishioners to help with the dinners. If you have been unable to

Preparation for the dinners starts at 12:30 p.m. on Thursdays in the kitchen. We need potato and cabbage cut along with fish being unpacked so that it can start to thaw. On Fridays we start around 6 a.m. to separate fish, make macaroni and cheese, and halushki. At 9 a.m. we start to fill containers for coleslaw, cut the cakes to be put in containers, and prepare to start the day for the orders.

We need dish washers in the morning to keep up with cleaning dirty items. We need cooks, servers, packing of the dinners, runners to deliver the orders to the cars, along with clean up at the end of the night.




