### Two Anthony's, One Shrine

Even though it was 30 degrees with a light frost on the lawn and rooftops in the backyard this morning, the calendar tells me Spring has arrived and it's time to bring out the statue of St. Anthony which serves as the centerpiece of our backyard shrine. Soon my spouse will plant flowers around the perimeter inside the stones and, in no time, we'll have a colorful outdoor space to stop and pray.

How I became enamored of the life and ministry of St. Anthony of Padua (died 1231) is interesting, since I am neither Italian nor Portuguese, the two nations that claim him to this day. I had already been a longtime devotee of St. Anthony of Egypt (251-356), that third century hermit so instrumental in the foundation of monasticism with his amazing life of desert solitude that, so ironically, attracted numerous followers.

It was on a diocesan pilgrimage about 25 years ago that we happened to stop for an unplanned visit to Padua's historic cathedral. Relics of the saint are prominently displayed there. At the time, my spiritual life had hit a new low, and the last thing I expected was to have any kind of religious experience.

But as we followed the pilgrimage guide through the structure, we passed by a special section highlighting St. Anthony. Suddenly I felt a sense of awe and wonder deep inside, almost as if the saint had been expecting me and wanted me to remain there a while for some serious discussion of my spiritual state.

The tour schedule did not permit that, but I felt changed for the rest of the week as we visited various holy sites. Ever since, I have felt a kinship with Anthony and often take a few moments, on days much warmer than this, to share a prayer or two by the statue in our own backyard and seek the real saint's intercession. Ditto for his desert counterpart.

There is much to admire about both of these men, much to emulate in studying their biographies. But for me, having these saints as unexpected role models speaks volumes about how God uses the events of our everyday lives to remind us of His daily interest in our well-being, and how He provides the avenues for us to see and experience them in our backyards and beyond.

#### Ursuline Nuns Seek Yarn






