What's A Productive Day?

There are certain phrases in every family's lore that survive the test of time and reverberate down through the years, long after the person or persons involved who uttered them have gone home to God.

One of those phrases popped into my mind recently when I thought of Dad saying "I feel a nap coming on." He loved his daily nap on the living room couch after work, when he'd tell us "I'm collecting my wits." At the time, I'm sure my younger brother and I would roll our eyes. But lately, Pop's daily nap makes a lot of sense, except that I think he would have been better off taking two.

Years ago I looked upon taking a nap as losing an hour or more out of a productive day. But ten years into "retirement," which did not become sitting in the two rockers staring into the sunset we had expected, I've come to look upon naps as not only welcome but an essential part of every day.

You could argue that my overall fatigue factors into that, but it has quite a bit to do with our schedule, too. We're up most days at 5:30 a.m., have a fairly busy morning until noon or 1 p.m., and by then I view a 60-to-90 minute respite as a necessity more than the luxury I never had during my "career" years. It's also the only way I can get anything meaningful done for the balance of the day.

Those words "productive day" are worth pondering. For decades my DNA seemed to push me to get out the next issue at whatever diocesan newspaper I was working, or to work my way through a list of daily chores around the house that had to be done. Looking back, some of it was quite necessary and some was busywork, but very little of it will help me at the Last Judgment.

I am sure I am not the only one who fell into the trap of feeling that a day without at least several tasks completed was not a productive day. And yet the greatest spiritual masters down through the centuries all seem to agree that a week, a day, an hour spent in quietude and prayer is worth infinitely more than ticking off items on a to-do list. So why does it take most of us so long to even begin to comprehend that?




